

# Man to serve 16 years in home invasion, shootout

A 22-year-old Lynchburg man who admitted he was one of four men who broke into a home and ended up involved in a shootout there was ordered to serve

16 years in prison.

Lynchburg Circuit Court Judge J. Leyburn Mosby Jr. sentenced Jarrod Shelton Terrell on Friday to a total of 43 years in prison, but suspended all but 16 years for several convictions, most stemming from the incident.

Terrell also must undergo drug testing

and treatment while incarcerated. When he is released he must complete two years of probation. Terrell also has to remain on good behavior for 25 years, starting the day of his sentencing.

Terrell, formerly of 106 Morgan St.,

## THE INCIDENT:

► On May 10, 2005, Jarrod Shelton Terrell and three other men went to the Shaffer Street home around 2:30 a.m. with the intent of robbing the residents. The men carried pistols and wore red bandanas to throw off the residents into thinking they were members of the Bloods gang.

► When they entered the home, Terrell put a gun to the head of one of the people inside the house.

► The four men then got involved in a gunfight with the occupants of the home. One of the intruders was injured.
