Three Lynchburg men may have walked away from a felony case with just misdemeanor convictions Friday, but they may long have the distinction of being Barbie bandits.

And one of their lawyers learned Judge Mosby Perrow's courtroom is not the place to mock the value of the collectible dolls.

The case stems from the April theft of several of the dolls from a rundown building in the 1600 block of Graves Mill Road. Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney Chuck Felmlee said the dolls were being stored there. Attorneys for the men contended they believed the building and the property inside had been abandoned.

Terrell Powell, 54, and Michael Wayne ment didn't make it as far with the judge. Bryant Jr., 23, had been facing convictions of grand larceny. Joel Bryant, 21, faced an in the room," in an attempt to claim the additional charge of obtaining money by false pretenses for trying to pawn some of the dolls.
